
We are the Shape People. We want you to know *our names*, and *what we look like*, and we want to show you *what we can do!*



Triangles




Triangle people live in trees. They love to eat tortollini, and make music on triangles. They like their sandwiches cut diagonally to make triangle halves or quarters.






Ovals like watermelon, and belly button-tickling! Diamonds like to fly kites! And Trapezoids have the same outline as their windshield!




Shapes' bodies are made of dots, lines and the spaces inside them. Lots of dots right next to each other make a line. Where two lines meet, the space between them is called an angle. An angle can be large or small . Can you make angles with your elbows? With dots and spaces and lines we can draw anything!




Squares and all the rectangles and diamonds and trapezoids are 4-sided cousins. But they have different angles or different-sized sides from each other. Check them out!



Shapes like to play together a lot. When they lean up against each other or hold hands, they can make new shapes! What shapes can you make with your friends?




Some shapes like to climb on each other and build towers. What shapes make up the things in your room? What shapes do you see outside?
